We held educational events throughout the year. We partnered with Kirk's Fly Shop to install catch-and-release signs in Big Thompson canyon. We placed 16 temperature probes in various stream locations to validate the feasibility of reintroducing native trout. We assisted Chris Kennedy of U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service with his recovery efforts in the park. And we created a Greenback Cutthroat Trout advocacy video. But we also heard from you that you would like to see more conservation opportunities. So our board is already at work planning how to offer you more opportunities to participate in 2019.
